BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (October 22, 2018) — The *Birmingham Business Journal* has named Lightfoot, Franklin & White LLC attorney **Clint Speegle** a 2018 “Veteran of Influence.” Honorees were recognized at a breakfast event on October 18 and in a **special section of the publication**.

A graduate of West Point, Speegle continues to give back to his alma mater as the head of recruiting for the Academy in Central Alabama. Since 2011, he has also served on the Military Academy Nomination Board for Alabama’s 6th Congressional District, which is currently represented by Congressman Gary Palmer.

Given his unique aviation and engineering background, Speegle focuses his legal practice on aviation-related issues.
